

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


Program Cover

An integrated focus can be seen in the scale and function of architecture in the heart of Montreal. In modern city planning, as in our society's health care systems, we strive to find a balance between the needs and impact of both old and new structures. Striking differences in style can clearly be seen in the neo-classical Mary, Queen of the World Cathedral, and the neighbouring postmodern IBM Marathon skyscraper. Both represent the symbol and focus of their eras in the style and functions they were meant to promote: a new structure cannot remain separate or aloof from its predecessors in the city or the society it seeks to serve.

Student Poster Competition



- 4. Demonstrated Understanding of the Student (recognition of limits of the study, familiar with research context).



The Centre favours a cross-disciplinary approach to research with academics from six different faculties organized into three key spheres of activity. The Research Centre is also home to the University Centre for Gerontology Studies that contributes to the development of future generations of researchers.



16. Centre de recherche de l'Institut universitaire de gériatrie de Montréal (CRIUGM)

The goal of the Centre de recherche of the Institut universitaire de gériatrie de Montréal is to determine the factors that promote better aging and to find solutions for the effective support of diseases and conditions that limit the quality of life and social participation of older adults. The research center comprises an advanced neuroimaging facility solely dedicated to research and different training laboratories. Research is divided into two axes: the neuroscience of aging (Axis 1) and the promotion of health, patient care, and intervention (Axis 2). These programs have attracted close to 250 research enthusiasts, including 42 principal investigators, 200 students and 50 post-doctoral fellows.



17. Gerontology Research Centre and Department, Simon Fraser University

Established in 1982, the SFU Gerontology Research Centre has an international reputation for research in six areas: Aging and the Built Environment, Health and Aging, Prevention of Elder Abuse and Neglect, Culture and Aging, Changing Demography and Lifestyles, and Technology and Aging. Opening Ceremony The Quebec Strategic Plan for the Elderly

Marguerite Blais



Marguerite Blais studied piano and organ at the Conservatoire de musique du Québec. She obtained a Master's degree (Université du Québec à Montréal (UQAM), 1997), a Doctorate (UQAM, Université de Montréal and Concordia University, 2005) and a Postdoctorate (UQAM, 2008) in communications. She also has some thirty years of experience as a television and radio host and journalist.

From 1996 to 2003, she served as general manager of the Fondation du maire de Montréal pour la jeunesse. She then accepted the presidency of the Conseil de la famille et de l'enfance (2003-2007). Elected to the National Assembly of Québec as the member for Saint-Henri-Sainte-Anne in the 2007 general election, she was re-elected in 2008. She has been the minister responsible for Seniors since 2007.

Marguerite Blais is involved with many charitable organizations, notably those dedicated to improving the lives of youth, seniors and the underprivileged in our society.

Aging, Work and Retirement

Victor W. Marshall, PhD

Professor of Sociology, Senior Research Scientist, Insitute on Aging; University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill

Dr. Marshall is the founding member of CAG, former chair of its Research Committee and Social Science Division, and Vice-President and Editor of the Canadian Journal on Aging. He received CAG's Distinguished Member and Evelyn Shapiro Mentoring Awards, and was the CAG selection for the Governor General Queen's Jubilee Medal. He graduated from the University of Calgary (BA) and Princeton University (PhD in sociology). His professorial career began in 1970 at McMaster University, with subsequent professorships at the University of Toronto (where he directed its Center on Aging and CARNET: The Canadian Aging Research Network), and The University of North Carolina, where he directed the Institute on Aging. He chaired the Gerontological Advisory Council of Veterans Affairs Canada for the past 15 years.

Dr. Marshall's research focuses on work and retirement, health, and public policy. His presentation will outline Canadian research developments in aging, work and retirement over the 40 year span of his career, in the context of international developments.

Réjean Hébert, MD, MPhil (Presentation by video)

Professor, Faculty of Medicine and Health Sciences, Université de Sherbrooke; Researcher, Centre de recherché sur le vieillissement de Sherbrooke; Science Advisor, Caisse nationale de solidarité pour l'autonomie, Paris, France

Professor Réjean Hébert is a geriatrician, gerontologist and epidemiologist. Until recently, he was the Dean of the Faculty of Medicine and Health Sciences at the Université de Sherbrooke. He is the founding director of the Centre de recherche sur le vieillissement at the Institut universitaire de gériatrie de Sherbrooke, the Réseau québécois de recherche sur le vieillissement and the Canadian Institutes of Health Research - Institute of Aging. His research work is focused on the loss of autonomy. family caregivers of patients with Alzheimer's Disease and the organization of services for elderly people with diminished independence. He is currently director of PRISMA, the Program of Research to Integrate the Services for the Maintenance of Autonomy. He has also served as co-chair of the Consultation publique sur les conditions de vie des aînés.

Anne Martin-Matthews, PhD Scientific Director, Institute of Aging, Canadian Institutes of Health Research

Dr. Anne Martin-Matthews is Scientific Director of the Institute of Aging of the Canadian Institutes of Health Research (CIHR) and a Professor of Sociology at the University of British Columbia. Her publications include books on Aging and Caring at the Intersection of Work and Home Life: Blurring the Boundaries and Widowhood in Later Life; and papers on aging and health, intergenerational relations, social support, caregiving, work - family balance, and rural aging. She has been active in the field of gerontology, health and aging in Canada, as an advisor to local, provincial and federal governments and on Board executives.

Currently, she is President of the Research Committee on Aging of the International Sociological Association and on the editorial Boards of Ageing and Society and the Journal of Aging Studies. She serves on the Gerontological Advisory Council for Veterans Affairs Canada, and is a Fellow of the Gerontological Society of America and of the Canadian Academy of Health Sciences.

Dr. Martin-Matthews will highlight key achievements of the Institute of Aging over the past decade, including the partnership with the Canadian Association on Gerontology (CAG) and the Canadian Longitudinal Study on Aging (CLSA). She will consider key challenges and opportunities in aging, including: the relationship between aging and disease, research capacity, citizen engagement and the research/practice/policy interface.

President, Canadian Institutes of Health Research

Before joining the CIHR in July 2008, Dr. Alain Beaudet was the President and Chief Executive Officer of the Fonds de la recherche en santé du Québec (FRSQ), a position held since 2004. Among his many accomplishments, Dr. Beaudet built a distinguished career at the world-renowned Montreal Neurological Institute (MNI). He headed the MNI's functional neuroanatomy laboratory, pursuing research into the mechanisms of neuropeptides in the central nervous system, targeting new pain therapies. Dr. Beaudet numerous distinctions include France's Order of Academic Palms distinguished Officer's award and Doctor honoris causa of Université Pierre et Marie Curie.

As CIHR and the Institute of Aging now embark on a decade review, and a strategic alignment of the Institute's priorities with CIHR's Roadmap, Dr.Beaudet's presentation will highlight the critical national and international roles of the Institute in addressing health in an aging population.

David Levine, MAdmin, MPhil

President-Executive Director Montreal Health and Social Services Agency

David Levine is president and executive director of the Agence de la santé et des services sociaux de Montréal since 2002. The Agence succeeded the Agence de développement de réseaux locaux de services de santé et de services sociaux de Montréal (2004) and the Régie régionale de la santé et des services sociaux de Montréal-Centre (Montreal Regional Health Board) where he had been appointed president and executive director by the government of Québec in June 2002.

Mr. Levine was previously junior health minister (2002) and Québec delegate general in New York (1997). He was also an advisor to the executive committee for the minister of state for economic development from 1977 to 1980.

Throughout his career, Mr. Levine has held key positions in organizations in Canada and the United States in the areas of health administration, research, biomedical engineering, medicine, and law. He has taught at several universities in Québec and Ontario.

Professor of Construction Management; The University of Reading, UK

Since 1997 Peter Lansley has been advising research councils, charities, professional bodies and the UK government on the development of national research programs concerned with the needs of older and disabled people. He has guided the EP-SRC EQUAL (Extending Quality Life) initiative, has directed

the EPSRC/BBSRC funded SPARC Programme (Strategic Promotion of Ageing Research Capacity) and now co-directs KT-EQUAL (Knowledge Transfer for Extending Quality Life).

Peter Lansley has published widely on organizational behaviour, human performance, the management of change and, more recently, assistive technology, in which he has a particular interest. He has received several awards for his work in the fields of innovation and inclusive design as well as for championing the role of the occupational therapist.



Graeme Evans, PhD, FCCA

Director, Cities Institute, London Metropolitan University, London, UK

Professor Graeme Evans has held senior project and management posts in government (Home Office), industry (energy, transport) and voluntary sectors, and for the past 22 years in academic research. He was Principal Investigator for the AUNT-SUE research consortium and Co-PI on VivaCity (www.vivacity2020.eu) and InSITU (www.insitu.org.uk) research studies under the EPSRC Sustainable Urban Environments programme. These studies developed novel research approaches combining participatory social survey, spatial analysis and urban design methods. This includes national toolkit resources developed for government under the Living Places initiative. He has led numerous studies on amenity planning, quality of life and public health, including a recent collaboration with CUNY and New York & London Mayors offices on Obesogenic Environments.



Catharine Ward Thompson, PhD

Research Professor of Landscape Architecture, Edinburgh College of Art and the University of Edinburgh, Edinburgh, Scotland

Catharine Ward Thompson is Director of OPENspace Research Centre and Research Professor of Landscape Architecture at Edinburgh College of Art and the University of Edinburgh. Her work focuses on inclusive access to outdoor environments, environment-behaviour interactions, historic landscapes and contemporary needs, and salutogenic environments. She currently directs the I'DGO (Inclusive Design for Getting Outdoors) research consortium, in collaboration with the Universities of Salford and Warwick, whose latest, £1.6m project focuses on ensuring that the outdoor environment is designed inclusively and with sensitivity to the needs and desires of older people, to improve their quality of life. She is also a member of the KT EQUAL knowledge exchange consortium, dedicated to extending quality life for older and disabled people. Both consortia are funded by the Engineering and Physical Sciences Research Council.

Nutrition and Brain Aging: From Isolated **Nutrients to Eating Behaviour**

Pascale Barberger-Gateau, MD, PhD

Team Director, Epidemiology of Nutrition and Eating Behaviours, INSERM Research Centre U897, University Victor Ségalen, Bordeaux, France

Dr. Pascale Barberger-Gateau is Associate Professor of Epidemiology and Public Health at the University Victor Ségalen, Bordeaux, since 1985. She is presently head of the Nutritional Epidemiology Team at INSERM Research Center U897, Epidemiology, Public Health and Development. For more than 20 years, her main field of research has focused on the epidemiology of aging, with a particular interest in Alzheimer's disease and its consequences on Activities of Daily Living. She is cur-

rently developing original research on nutritional protective or risk factors of Alzheimer's disease based on the French PAQUID and Three-City cohort studies. She is the coordinator of the COGINUT (COGnition, anti-oxidants, and fatty acids: Interdisciplinary approach of the role of NUTrition in brain aging) research program funded by the French National Agency for Research. Among her main findings is the evidence of a protective association of regular fish, fruits and vegetables consumption with decreased risk for dementia and Alzheimer's disease, with an interesting interaction with the ApoE genotype. She is a member of the editorial boards of Disability and Rehabilitation since 1997 and of the European Journal of Ageing since its creation in 2004.

Chief Public Health Officer, Public Health Agency of Canada

Dr. Butler-Jones has been involved as a researcher in a broad range of public health issues. He is a Professor in the Faculty of Medicine at the University of Manitoba and a Clinical Professor with the Department of Community Health and Epidemiology at the University of Saskatchewan's College of Medicine. He has served with a large number of prestigious Canadian and international organizations in the areas of public health, health and climate change, preventive medicine, and population health.
