2. Merit of the Research (validity of conclusions, relevancy to field of aging, potential for application)
3. Quality of Abstract and Content (coherence, logical flow, grammar, spelling, concise abstract)
4. Demonstrated Understanding of the Student (recognition of limits of the study, familiar with research context)
5. Special Merit marks will be awarded for innovative, novel research projects.



Frailty - Two Perspectives on Clinical and Scientific Challenges (19:25 - 20:15)



Jeremy Walston, MD

The Raymond and Anna Lublin Professor of Geriatric Medicine, Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine, Baltimore, Maryland, USA

Jeremy Walston is a Geriatrician with a longstanding research and clinical interest in the biological basis of frailty and late life decline. He has published over 100 peer reviewed publications with a focus on the genetics of late life decline and on chronic inflammatory pathway activation in older adults. He is the director of the NIH funded Johns Hopkins Older American Independence Center that provides infrastructure and human resources for training of investigators and for pilot studies related to frailty. He is the co-director of the Biology of Frailty program at Johns Hopkins, where he helps lead the development of research into aging related changes in the renin-angiotensin system, the anemia of chronic disease, and immunosenescence. He is a native of Ohio, matriculated from medical school at the University of Cincinnati, and completed an internal medicine residency and Geriatrics fellowship at Johns Hopkins University in Baltimore. He has been a faculty member at Johns Hopkins since 1993, where he continues to practice Geriatric Medicine, teach students, residents, and fellows, and perform research. He was awarded the Raymond and Anna Lublin Professorship in Geriatric Medicine at Johns Hopkins in 2011.

SESSION DESCRIPTION: Accurate and consistent measurement of frailty is crucial for the identification of those older adults most at risk for adverse health outcomes. Investigators at Johns Hopkins University have focused on the development of an aggregate physiological model of physical frailty and on the biological pathways that underlie this model of frailty. Dr. Walston will discuss the pros and cons of this model, its clinical translational potential, and important new biological discoveries related to this model of frailty that help provide a framework for understanding the connections between aging biology, frailty, and late life vulnerability to adverse health outcomes.



Kenneth Rockwood, MD, FRCPC, FRCP

Professor of Medicine (Geriatric Medicine & Neurology) Dalhousie University, Halifax, Nova Scotia Canada

Kenneth Rockwood has had a longstanding interest in clinical and epidemiological aspects of frailty, dementia and delirium. He has focused his investigations on the complexity of frailty, and on what can be termed 'clinico-mathematical correlation'. Dr. Rockwood has published

more than 300 peer-reviewed scientific publications and seven books, including the seventh edition of the Brocklehurst's Textbook of Geriatric Medicine & Gerontology. He is the Kathryn Allen Weldon Professor of Alzheimer research at Dalhousie University, and a staff internist and geriatrician at the Capital District Health Authority in Halifax. He holds several CIHR grants, including as Principal Investigator of the Canada China Collaboration on Aging and Longevity and the Canadian Dementia Knowledge Translation Network. The latter is a national, multicentre project to provide better care for people with dementia by facilitating and carrying out translational research and knowledge translation. A native of Newfoundland, he became a Doctor of Medicine at Memorial University in 1985, completed internal medicine training at the University of Alberta and geriatric medicine at Dalhousie University, where he has been on staff since 1991.

SESSION DESCRIPTION: This will be a debate between Dr. Walston and me. My presentation will consider frailty as a predisposition to adverse health outcomes, which arises as a consequence of the accumulation of deficits. This is measured using a frailty index. The presentation will show that frailty index estimates are remarkably consistent across countries and help inform our understanding of the mechanisms of aging.

Making a Longer Life Worth Living: Supporting Each Other in the Age of Social Media (9:55 - 10:45)

Alex Jadad, MD, DPhil, FRCPC, FCAHS

Chief Innovator and Founder, Centre for Global eHealth Innovation

Alex Jadad's research and innovation work focuses on virtual tools to support the encounter between the public and the health system; interactive tools to promote knowledge translation and mentorship of health professionals and the public; and online resources to support social networks, to respond to major public health threats, to support international collaboration, and to enable the public to shape the health system and society.

In 2000, Dr. Jadad led the creation of the Centre for Global eHealth Innovation, a setting designed as a simulator of the future, to study and optimize the use of ICTs before their introduction into the health system and society at large. He is also spearheading the development of the Global People-centred eHealth Innovation Network, a group of individuals, organizations, tools and facilities working to promote research, development, education, policy, funding, recognition and commercialization activities related to the uses of ICTs to promote optimal levels of health and wellness.

He also leads the People, Health equity and Innovation (PHI) Group at the University of Toronto, which focuses on efforts to level the playing field for disadvantaged members of society, with emphasis on youth leadership development, supportive care and the promotion of a culture of multiculturalism.

Curing our Boomerangst: Myths and Realities Of and Possible Responses to the Demographics and Macroeconomics of an Aging Population (13:45 - 14:35)



Kimberlyn McGrail, PhD

Assistant Professor and Associate Director, UBC School of Population and Public Health and Centre for Health Services and Policy Research

Kimberlyn McGrail, PhD, is an assistant professor at the University of British Columbia, associate director of the UBC Centre for Health Services and Policy Research, a senior researcher with Statistics Canada and an associate with the Centre for Clinical Epidemiology and Evaluation. She is also a board member and scientific advisor for Population Data BC, a resource dedicated to making linkable, longitudinal administrative data available to researchers. Dr. McGrail's current research interests are in variations in health care services use and outcomes, aging and the use of health care services and understanding health care as a determinant of health. She has collaborated with provincial and federal policy- and decision-makers, including the BC Ministry of Health Services, the Health Council of Canada and the Canadian Institute for Health Information. Dr. McGrail was the 2009-10 Commonwealth Fund Harkness Associate in Health Care Policy and Practice. She holds a PhD in Health Care and Epidemiology from the University of British Columbia, and a Master's in Public Health from the University of Michigan.

SESSION DESCRIPTION: The Canadian population is aging. The demographics are clear, but the macroeconomic and health care system impacts of those trends are less certain. This presentation will cover some possible futures and a range of policy responses, including recommendations for changes in the financing and delivery of health care services.

Frailty and Cognitive Impairment: A Complex Interaction (18:05 - 18:55)



Luis Miguel Gutiérrez-Robledo, MD Ph.D.

Professor of Geriatric Medicine National University of Mexico, National Researcher in Health Sciences, Geriatrics Chair, National Academy of Medicine, Founding Director, Institute of Geriatrics National Institutes of Health Mexico

Luis Miguel Gutiérrez-Robledo, MD Ph.D. is a Mexican scholar trained in geriatric medicine and the biology of aging in France who received a Ph.D. in Public Health and epidemiology from the University of Bordeaux in 2005. He has served in the faculty of the National University of Mexico School of Medicine, since 1994, where he created the geriatric medicine specialty program.

He founded the Department of Geriatrics at the National Institute of Medical Sciences and Nutrition in 1989 and he was its Head until January 2009.

He is presently the first Director General of the Institute of Geriatrics at the National Institutes of Health in Mexico.

Dr. Gutierrez's research agenda focuses on the epidemiology of aging in Mexico and more specifically on frailty and dementia and the interface between both conditions.

He has served on various national and global committees including the Advisory Committee at the International Association of Gerontology and Geriatrics, the Council on Ageing of the Mexico City government and as advisor to the Pan American Health Organization on geriatrics and gerontology; and in the editorial boards of the journals *Revista Española de Geriatria y Gerontología*, *Revista Colombiana de Geriatria y Gerontología*, *Revista de Investigación Clínica* and the recently created *European Geriatric Medicine*. He is a founding member of the Latin American Academy for the Medicine of Ageing (ALMA), and serves the profession in multiple ways including as a member of the review study sections of the *Consejo Nacional de Ciencia y Tecnología*.

He has over 100 publications published in Mexico, the United States, France, Canada, Costa Rica, Panama and Brazil.

He has been awarded the Chevalier des Palmes Académiques by the French Government in 2006.

SESSION DESCRIPTION: I will elaborate about research on the relationship between cognitive impairment and frailty, the complex interactions between both phenomena will be reviewed, mainly from the epidemiological perspective. I will be dealing mainly with data from Hispanic populations.

Richard Hammond, BES, BArch, LEED AP, GGP

Principal, Cornerstone Architecture Incorporated, Vice President, Jack and Barbara Hay Foundation

Richard Hammond’s a Principal Architect with Cornerstone Architecture in London Ontario. Since its establishment in 1991, Cornerstone’s work has focused on four sectors: facilities for children, public assembly projects, educational buildings, and seniors’ communities; with projects located across Southwestern Ontario. A significant proportion of Mr. Hammond’s practice involves the design of continuum of care facilities for seniors; including long term care, assisted living, and supported apartments. He has developed expertise in the design of facilities for persons with dementia; having completed a number of these specialized projects including some which have been presented and published internationally.

In 2005, Mr. Hammond became a LEED Accredited Professional through the Canada Green Building Council, which has led to an ongoing interest in the design of sustainable buildings. In 2007, Mr. Hammond was involved in the completion of the first LEED Gold Certified building in the London region, the New Residence for the Sisters of St. Joseph. He is currently involved with numerous other green building projects certified under both the LEED and Green Globes standards. To further his expertise in this field, Richard has recently completed a graduate program in Sustainable Development and Technology at Arizona State University’s School of Sustainable Engineering and the Built Environment; in which he is participated as an online student.




