Substantial increases in the numbers of Canadians 65 years of age and older are projected over the next 20 years. Increased life expectancy is often accompanied by disability, with a substantial portion of this disability stemming from two major geriatric syndromes: mobility and cognitive impairment. Walking is an important marker of mobility, and there is evidence that older people usually walk slower than when they were younger. This gait slowing is often attributed to "normal" aging although it has been demonstrated that slow gait velocity is a marker of preclinical diseases. Similarly, aging is associated with decreases in cognitive functioning and the development of dementia. It has been estimated that 8% of Canadians aged 65 and older meet the criteria for dementia and this prevalence increases to 35% in people over age 85. Further, mobility and cognitive impairment appear to become more related as people age. Specifically, gait slowing and dementia often co-exist in the same individual and have been attributed to changes in specific brain regions and may contribute to an increased risk of falls and disability.

This workshop will discuss this entangled relationship between mobility and cognition as people age and explore possibilities for a unified research approach to these prevalent syndromes. We will provide a forum for exchange of vanguard national and international health research knowledge in this emerging research area. From basic mechanisms and epidemiological evidence we will move to the whole person in their environment and set the stage for potential interventional strategies and areas of inquiry during roundtable interaction.



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
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
