



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

Opening Keynote Address

Don't Fear the Media: How Gerontologists Can Talk, Tweet and Blog Their Way to a Greater Role in an Aging Society (19:30 - 20:30)



Paula Span, BA School of Journalism, Columbia University

Paula Span's focus on aging and caregiving began with her book "When the Time Comes: Families

With Aging Parents Share Their Struggles and Solutions," published by Hachette in 2009. She became the primary reporter and writer of the New York Times' New Old Age blog the following year (http://newoldage.blogs.nytimes.com).

Formerly a veteran Washington Post reporter, she has published articles in many local and national magazines and newspapers, including the Wall Street Journal, the Boston Globe, the Philadelphia Inquirer, Esquire, Parenting, Redbook and New York Magazine.

Ms. Span has taught at the Columbia University Graduate School of Journalism since 1999 and from 2010 through 2011 directed the foundation-funded News21 program, whose fellows produced innovative multimedia content about aging. The team's work appeared on the Columbia News21 websites, "Brave Old World" and "Our Future Selves," and in national media outlets including The Washington Post, Forbes.com, the New York Times website, Kaiser Health News and AARP Bulletin.

Ms. Span is an alumna of Boston University (B.S. in journalism) and the alternative press (the Boston Phoenix).

Research and Geriatric Medicine: The Road Less Travelled (9:30 – 10:40)



John Young, MB BS (Hons), MSc, MBA, FRCP School of Medicine, University of Leeds

John Young trained at the Middlesex Hospital, University of London. He was appointed as

a consultant geriatrician in Bradford, West Yorkshire, UK in 1986. He took on responsibilities as a clinical manager and developed numerous new services including an elderly care assessment unit; a stroke unit; and an ortho-geriatric unit. Research interests became embedded in the clinical work and included evaluations (mostly by RCT) of days hospitals, stroke care and intermediate care services.

In 2005 he was appointed to a new position as Head of the Academic Unit of Elderly Care & Rehabilitation, University of Leeds. This unit is now one of the largest elderly care applied health research units in the UK. Current research work includes MRC and NIHR Programme Grant funded multi-centre trials in the areas of stroke, delirium and dementia care. Quality improvement work includes leading the design and implementation of national audits of intermediate care and of dementia care in the UK.

Between 2001 and 2007 John was seconded to the Department of Health to assist in policies to improve the care for older people nationally. He was chairman of the British Geriatrics Society English Council, and was Chairman of the NICE Clinical Guideline Development Group for delirium. In 2009 he was awarded the Lady Illingworth prize for "outstanding contributions" to services for older people. He has recently been seconded to the NHS Commissioning Board as National Clinical Director for Older People's Services.

John is still an active fell racer, but these days is happy to gradually accumulate speed rather than accelerate down the hills.

Family Caregivers of Elderly Persons... Looking Back and Forward (1:30 – 14:40)



Francine Ducharme, PhD

Faculty of Nursing, University of Montréal

Francine Ducharme, Ph.D., is a full professor at the Faculty of Nursing of the Université de

Montréal and a researcher at the Centre de recherche de l'Institut universitaire de gériatrie de Montréal, a research center on aging. She is holder of the Desjardins Research Chair in Nursing Care for Seniors and their Families and member of the Canadian Academy of Health Science. In 2010, she was a laureate of the Distinction Awards of the Women's Y Foundation of Montreal. For the last twentyfive years, her research interests include determinants of health and quality of life of family caregivers of the elderly at home or in long term care settings and evaluation of psychoeducational interventions for family caregivers of vulnerable elderly persons. Her research, published in scientific and professional journals, was funded by the Canadian Institutes of Health Research, the Alzheimer Society of Canada, The Fonds de la recherche du Québec en santé and the Institut national de recherche scientifique (France).

Dementia: Is it complicated or is it simple?



Kenneth Rockwood, MD, FRCPC, FRCP

Dalhousie University

Kenneth Rockwood is professor of geriatric medicine and neurology at Dalhousie Univer-

sity and a geriatrician at the Centre of Health Care for the Elderly at Capital District Health Authority in Halifax, Nova Scotia. A native of Newfoundland, he became a Doctor of Medicine at Memorial University in 1985, completed internal medicine training at the University of Alberta and geriatric medicine at Dalhousie University, where he has been on staff since 1991. For the last 7 years, in addition to his memory clinics, most of his clinical work is in the Capital District Health Authority as the Department of Medicine's Senior Internist, doing internal medicine consultations in the Emergency Department. Since 2008, he has held an adjunct appointment as Professor in the Institute of Brain, Behaviour and Mental Health at the University of Manchester. He was appointed the Kathryn Allen Weldon Professor of Alzheimer Research at Dalhousie University in 2001 (and has been twice re-appointed). These are outstanding honours in a research career that has also seen several awards in Canada, the US, the UK, Europe, Asia and Australia.

Ken's research focuses on clinical and epidemiological aspects of frailty, dementia and delirium. Over the last 20 years, working with the mathematician Arnold Mitnitski, this has evolved to focus investigations on the complexity of frailty and the dynamics of age-related changes in cognition. He has published more than 350 peer-reviewed scientific publications and seven books, including the seventh edition of the Brocklehurst's Textbook of Geriatric Medicine & Gerontology.

William Lahey is an Associate Professor at the Schulich School of Law and the School of

Health Administration, Dalhousie University. He is a member and past Director of the Dalhousie Health Law Institute and a member of Dalhousie's Marine and Environmental Law Institute. He is a Rhodes Scholar graduate of Mount Allison University and has law degrees from the University of Oxford and the University of Toronto. He teaches Public Law, Administrative Law and Health Systems Law and Policy and is the winner of two Law School teaching awards. He has published in the fields of health law, administrative law, constitutional law, environmental law, and legal history. He is consulted on law and policy in multiple fields, including health, energy, environment and professional regulation. He is the founding Chair of the Board of Directors of Efficiency Nova Scotia Corporation and Vice-Chair of the Nova Scotia Health Research Foundation. He has served as Deputy Minister of the Nova Scotia Department of Environment and Labour (2004-2007); Assistant Deputy Minister of the Nova Scotia Department of Health (1998-2001); Chief Counsel to the Panel appointed to advise Canada and Nova Scotia on settlement of offshore revenue disputes (2008); and as Independent Reviewer (with Mr. Justice La Forest) of Nova Scotia's mental health legislation. He began his legal career by clerking with Mr. Justice La Forest of the Supreme Court of Canada and has practiced law in both the private and public sectors.

Healing Approaches for Elder Abuse and Mistreatment

Ms. Arlene Groh RN, BA, is a consultant for Healing Approaches for Elder Abuse and Mistreat-

ment (www.healingapproaches.com). She pioneered and coordinated the Restorative Justice Approaches to Elder Abuse Project and was a founding member of Waterloo Region's Elder Abuse Response Team. (For related publications please see her website.) She chairs the Waterloo Mayor's Advisory Committee on Age-Friendly Cities

Arlene is a passionate champion and strategist for working in partnership to identify, resolve and prevent elder abuse. Her practice is guided by restorative justice philosophy and values. She is the recipient of many awards for her outstanding contribution to seniors and her dedication to the prevention of elder abuse.

In 2009 Arlene initiated a movement for the City of Waterloo to actively engage in preventing elder abuse by becoming an Age Friendly City. With the support of the Mayor, City staff and residents an Age Friendly City Mayor's Advisory Committee was formed with a goal to ensure that Waterloo is a place where all residents age safely, enjoy good health and participate fully in their community. Lead subcommittees addressed each of the eight areas of AFC as outlined by the World Health Organization. Dr. John Lewis, University of Waterloo, provides ongoing assessment and evaluation of Waterloo's AFC status.

In September 2011, the City of Waterloo was named a member of the World Health Organization's Global Network of Age-friendly Cities. The Mayor's Report that includes key findings, recommendations and an action plan was released in June 2013.



The combination of population aging and policy shifts emphasizing aging at home has resulted in escalating numbers of community dwelling persons vulnerable to the impacts of emergencies and disasters. In addition, the frequency and scale of disasters is predicted to increase due to factors like global warming and expansion of human habitats. This poses a major challenge for first and secondary responders such as the fire department, paramedics and expert disaster management organizations such as the Canadian Red Cross.



Relatively recent developments in electronic health records provide an unprecedented opportunity to leverage comprehensive assessment information collected as standard clinical practice in the health sector in the identification of vulnerable persons. In many Canadian jurisdictions, assessment information is supported by sophisticated software, data warehouses and reporting systems - the foundation needed to leverage assessment information and enable a prompt and effective disaster response for vulnerable community dwelling persons.

This symposium will review what is known about disaster response for vulnerable persons, the gaps that have been identified, and what resources could be leveraged to fill those gaps. These resources include pervasive, standardized health assessment information systems (interRAI), the reach of recognized disaster response organizations (Red Cross) and the voice of experience (wisdom shared by care providers who deliver their ordinary services under extraordinary circumstances.)

Healing Approaches to Senior Abuse: the Fundy Network is a diverse and broad collation with representation from the Department of Seniors, Department of Justice, RCMP, Elder Law Specialists, Senior Safety Coordinators, Universities, Restorative Justice Practitioners, Nova Scotia Human Rights Commission, and of course, seniors themselves and other valued community members. Our HASA Network has developed a planned intervention model that is based on finding restorative ways to heal harm to seniors. The pilot project involves Senior Safety Coordinators and Restorative Justice Agencies working closely together to identify seniors who have experienced harm and are interested in exploring restorative approaches to healing those harms. In this workshop we will explore restorative approaches to dispute resolution and healing of harms. We delve more deeply into senior abuse and senior safety issues. Finally, we give participants the opportunity to see restorative approaches to senior abuse at work through a participatory demonstration.
