Greetings from the President of McMaster University



5. Special Merit marks will be awarded for innovative, novel research projects.

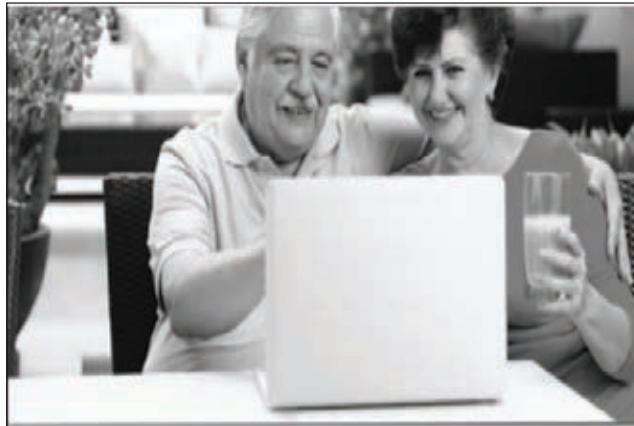

Julia Twigg, PhD
University of Kent

Julia Twigg is Professor of Social Policy and Sociology at the University of Kent. Her recent work has focused on the role of dress in the constitution of age, exploring this through a series of interconnected projects. In 2013 she published *Fashion and Age: Dress the Body and Later Life*. She is currently completing a study of Dementia and Dress, exploring issues of personhood, embodiment and memory. Beyond Environmental Gerontology:

Malcolm Cutchin, PhD
Wayne State University

Malcolm Cutchin is Chair of Health Care Sciences at Wayne State University. He previously held appointments at Middlebury College (Geography), the University of Texas Medical Branch (Occupational Therapy & Sealy Center on Aging), and the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill (Occupational Science and Occupational Therapy, Institute on Aging, & Geography). Professor Cutchin's scholarship has focused primarily on human-place relationships and well-being, and more specifically on how older people experience transitions in residential contexts. His work is deeply influenced by the philosophy of John Dewey. From 2007 to 2011, he was the Editor-in-Chief of the *Journal of Applied Gerontology*. Two recent projects include the four-volume set *Researching Social Gerontology* (Sage, 2013; edited with Candace Kemp and Victor Marshall) and *Transactional Perspectives on Occupation* (Springer, 2013; edited with Virginia Dickie). His latest funded project is an inquiry into daily activities, neighborhood stressors, and the well-being of older African-Americans in Detroit.

Christopher Phillipson, PhD
University of Manchester

Professor Chris Phillipson is Director of the Manchester Institute for Collaborative Research on Ageing (MICRA). Before moving to the University of Manchester in 2012, Chris Phillipson held a variety of posts at Keele University including Dean of Research for the Social Sciences and Director of the Social Science Research Institutes. He was also a Pro-Vice Chancellor for the University and founded (in 1987) the Centre for Social Gerontology. He has published extensively on a range of topics in the field of ageing, including work in the field of family and community studies, social inclusion/exclusion, urban sociology, and social theory. Recent publications include the *Handbook of Social Gerontology* (co-edited with Dale Dannefer, Sage Books, 2010), *Work, Health and Wellbeing* (co-edited, Policy Press, 2012), and *Ageing* (Polity Press, 2013). He is currently co-investigator of a project examining transitions from work to retirement (funded under the UK Medical Research Council-led programme Life Long Health and Well-being).

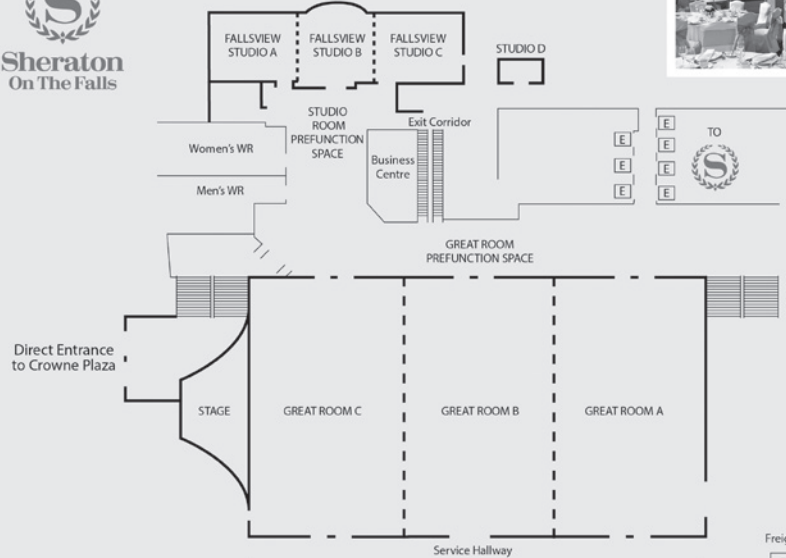

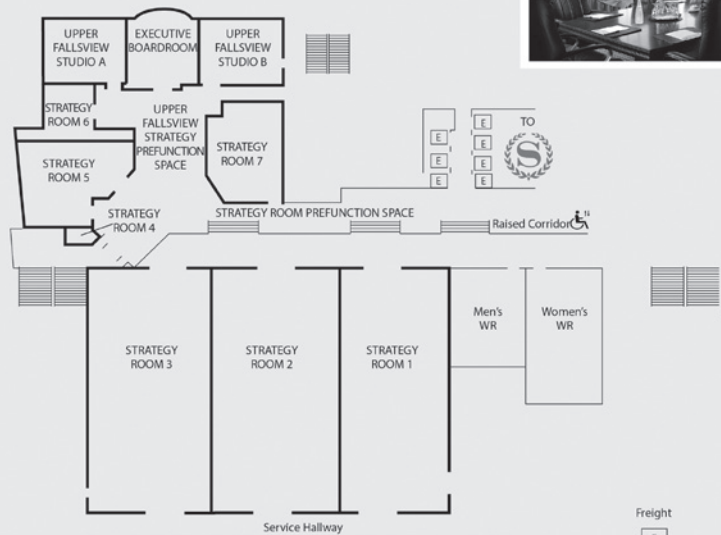

Clinicians practicing in Long-Term Care face unique challenges caring for elderly individuals including multiple co-morbidities and prescribing contraindications. With the advent of the 2010 Osteoporosis Canada Clinical Practice guidelines, and in light of many new therapeutic options, establishing a clear consensus document for managing osteoporosis and fracture prevention in Long-Term Care is urgently needed. This symposium will focus on the prevention of fractures in long-term care. Participants will be provided with an introduction to the GRADE process for guidelines development and a summary of the evidence for our new Fracture Prevention Guidelines for Long-Term Care, and an introduction to our tools and resources that have been developed for the dissemination of our guidelines. These are the first guidelines developed for LTC and therapeutic care of osteoporosis and fracture prevention using the GRADE approach. Additionally, participants will learn about how nurse practitioners are involved in guideline implementation for fracture prevention and be provided with an overview of new physical activity recommendations for individuals with osteoporosis. Finally, the ViDOS (Vitamin D and Osteoporosis study) study, a cluster randomized trial that evaluated the feasibility and effectiveness of a knowledge translation (KT) intervention aimed at integrating evidence-based osteoporosis/fracture prevention strategies in Long-term Care (LTC) homes will be reviewed. There is a clear need to integrate osteoporosis and falls strategies to reduce fracture in long-term care. The implications of these guidelines for the frail elderly with multiple co-morbidities and those at high risk of falls in long-term care are highly relevant.

	<p>Supporting safe mobility of the aging population represents one of the single greatest public health challenges facing Canadian society and other Westernized countries. For many seniors, access to transportation and, in particular, driving, has been identified as instrumental to independence and remaining mobile in their community. Unfortunately, with age, people are more likely to develop health problems that affect safety when using an automobile. To date, initiatives targeting older driver safety have mostly focused on the driver, such as developing physician-screening tools. Such initiatives, while important, do not consider the driving environment, including vehicle design, which also influence mobility and safety behind-the-wheel.</p> <p>For the automotive industry, the aging population represents a major shift from younger consumers to cross-generational designs that have take into account both age and ability. Older consumers are set to become the single largest market of car buyers. Developing interventions that consider the interface between older adults and the design of the vehicle requires a unique combination of technical expertise in engineering design and knowledge of the effects of aging and health on driving-related tasks.</p> <p>This symposium highlights findings from a unique cross-faculty research initiative examining the relationship between older drivers and vehicle design at McMaster University.
