
Message from Honourable Sarah Hoffman Minister of Seniors

These studies are being conducted in Ontario and Alberta, in collaboration with more than 30 inter-professional researchers and 60 stakeholders (patients, family caregivers, community agencies, health system decision makers and policy makers).

Opening Keynote Address

Known and unknown unknowns: Balancing knowledge creation and implementation



David B. Hogan, MD
University of Calgary

Born in Baie Comeau (Quebec), David's medical education took place in Nova Scotia (Dalhousie University), Alberta (University of Alberta), and Ontario (University of Ottawa, University of Western Ontario). He is a sub-specialist in geriatric medicine. From 1984 till 1990 he was a member of the Faculty of Medicine, Dalhousie University where, among other duties, he served as Associate Dean for Undergraduate Medical Education. In 1990 he moved to the University of Calgary where he founded and was the inaugural Head of the Division of Geriatric Medicine. David holds the Brenda Strafford Foundation Chair in Geriatric Medicine at the University of Calgary (he was the first Chair in geriatric medicine appointed in Canada) and over the years has served as Chair of the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons of Canada (RCPSC) Specialty Committee in Geriatric Medicine, Chief Examiner in Geriatric Medicine for the RCPSC, President of the Canadian Geriatrics Society, President of the C5R (a national network of dementia researchers), and editor of the Canadian Geriatrics Journal. David has authored over 500 publications including approximately 220 peer-reviewed papers. Research interests include healthy aging, cognitive decline and dementia (and its various causes such as Alzheimer disease), falls, frailty, and health services for older Canadians. He holds leadership positions in two important national research initiatives, the Canadian Longitudinal Study on Aging and the Canadian Consortium on Neurodegeneration in Aging. National recognition includes the William B. Spaulding Award, the Irma M. Parhad Award, and the Prix d'excellence of the RCPSC.

Thomas Scharf, PhD
National University of Ireland, Galway

Dr. Thomas Scharf is Professor of Social Gerontology and Director of the Irish Centre for Social Gerontology, NUI Galway, Ireland. He is a Fellow of the UK Academy of Social Sciences and Visiting Professor at Keele University (UK) having recently held visiting professorships at the universities of Vienna (Austria) and Manchester (UK). Dr Scharf is a member of the Scientific Board of the German Ageing Survey (DEAS) and of the Steering Group for The Irish Longitudinal Study of Ageing (TILDA). As a member of the Executive Committee of the Irish Gerontological Society he was Social Gerontology Lead on the Organising Committee for the International Association of Gerontology and Geriatrics European Region Congress, Dublin, 2015. Dr Scharf's research has been supported by major grants from the UK Economic and Social Research Council, the UK New Dynamics of Ageing program, the Irish Research Council, and The Atlantic Philanthropies. Since 2000, he has been running a major program of research on social inclusion/exclusion, initially in the UK and more recently in Ireland. In Ireland, reflecting his expertise in issues connecting older people to the places in which they live, Dr Scharf plays a leading role as scientific advisor to the national Age-friendly Cities and Counties program. He has published widely in leading journals, including the Journal of Gerontology: Social Sciences, the European Journal of Ageing, Ageing and Society, and the Journal of Rural Studies. His most recent book is *From Exclusion to Inclusion in Old Age: A Global Challenge* (2012, co-edited with Norah Keating and published by The Policy Press).

Challenges and opportunities in knowledge translation in health care



Sharon Straus, MD
University of Toronto

Dr. Straus is a Professor in the Department of Medicine at the University of Toronto. She holds a Tier 1 Canada Research Chair in Knowledge Translation and Quality of Care and more than \$30 million in peer reviewed research grants as a principal investigator. She has >300 publications, and has supervised >20 graduate students from different disciplines including clinical epidemiology, health informatics and human factors engineering. She is co-PI of KT Canada, a CIHR and CFI funded national, Clinical Research Initiative, PI of KT Canada's CIHR-funded Strategic Training Initiative in Health Research and PI of a network meta-analysis team grant for the Drug Safety and Effectiveness Network. She is Division Director of Geriatric Medicine at the University of Toronto and Director of the KT Program at the Li Ka Shing Knowledge Institute of St. Michael's. She has authored three books. Evidence-based medicine: How to practice and teach it is in its fourth edition, and has been published in 8 languages; Knowledge Translation in Health Care, is now in its second edition; and the first edition of Mentorship in Academic Medicine.

Dancing in the dark? Connecting social research and policy



Janet Fast, PhD
University of Alberta

Dr. Janet Fast is a professor in the Department of Human Ecology at the University of Alberta. Throughout her career, Dr. Fast has engaged in research, policy and practice with a focus on the economics of aging and the paid and unpaid care of family members. Her research addresses family, labour, health and continuing care policy issues, and she is often called upon to consult with or advise government policy-makers and NGOs on policy related to caregiving and workplace supports. She currently co-leads an international and multidisciplinary research team investigating the intersection of work and care across the life course.

From her first professional jobs in community education, practice and advocacy work with national and local NGOs, Dr. Fast has worked to create and transfer knowledge, to engage with public, government and other user groups, and to work at the interfaces among them. Her numerous publications include chapters in books such as *Blurring the Boundaries: Ageing at the Intersection of Work and Home Life*, *Family Time: the Social Organization of Care*, and *Rural Ageing: A Good Place to Grow Old?* She has also contributed research articles to a number of academic journals including *Research on Aging*, *Canadian Journal on Aging* and *Journal of Family and Economic Issues*.

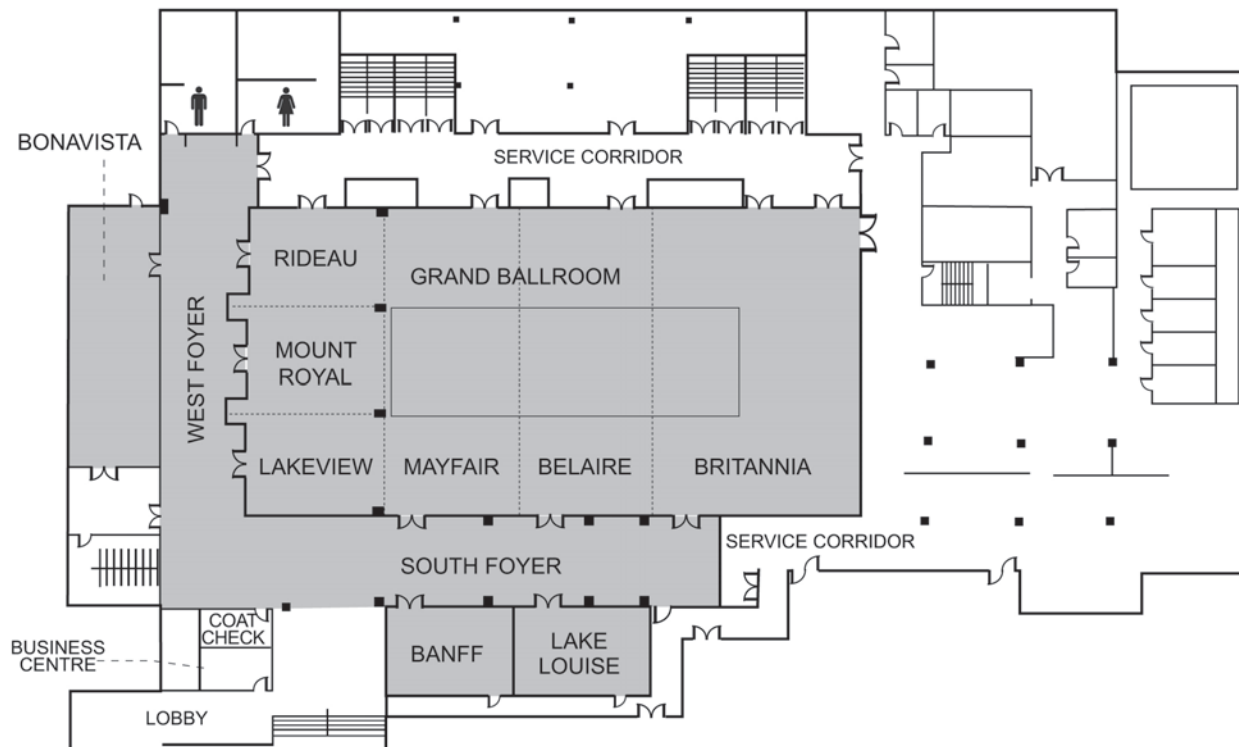

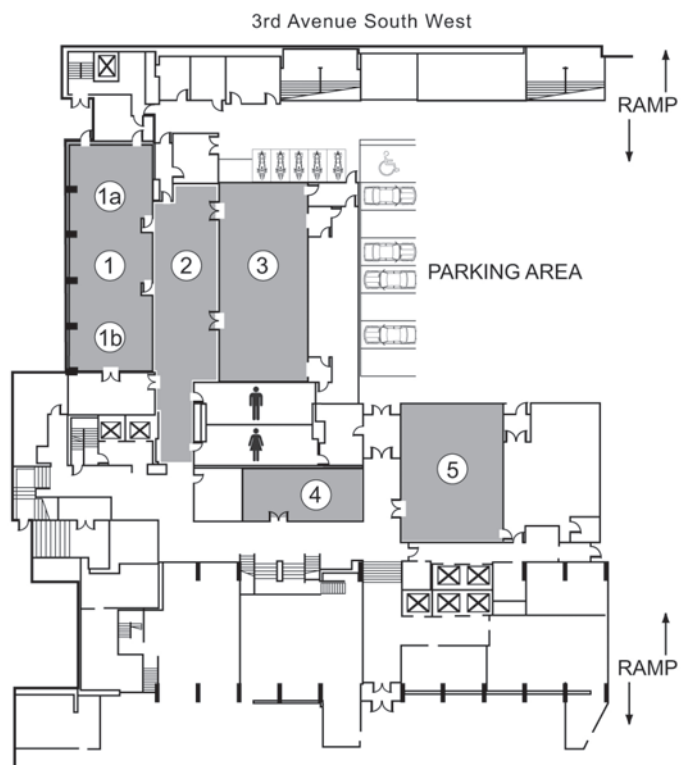

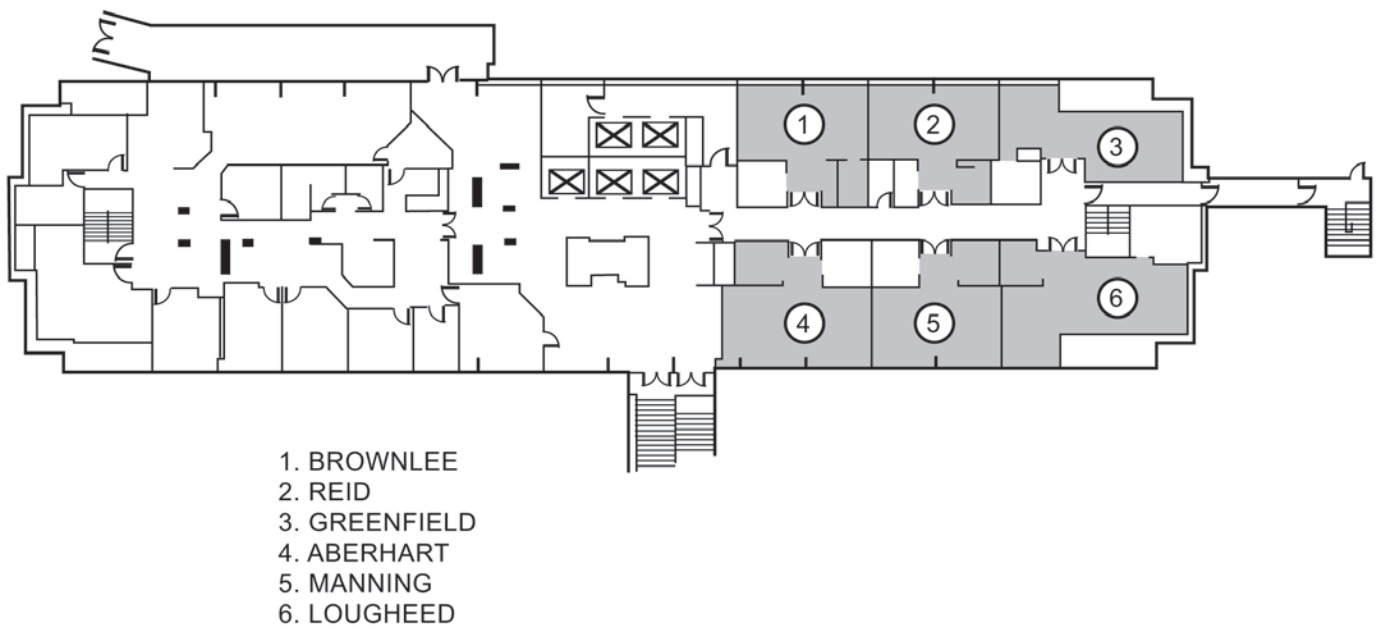

	Caregivers are heterogeneous in the intensity of their caregiving commitments, demographic profiles, and labour force patterns. A growing issue of concern is in the ability for caregivers to remain productively employed and financially stable while providing additional support to their dependents. The latest evidence suggests that some caregivers are much more likely to leave their jobs entirely and that the decision to do so is most often permanent. Leaving the labour force is detrimental to caregivers because it puts them at risk for: lower incomes and smaller pensions; issues with labour force re-entry; economic losses, and; poverty over the long term. Other examples of losses experienced by caregiver-employees whom decide to stay employed include: relinquished management positions, refused promotions, and unfair treatment by coworkers and managers. This symposium will highlight current Canadian research on paid employment and unpaid caregiving, accentuating employers' and supervisor's roles in mitigating: the multiple tensions experienced by caregiver-employees, and the costs employers incur as a result of informal caregiving. Further, work interruptions/interferences as a result of caregiving will be discussed.
